Canadair CF104 Starfighter Anthony L. Stachiw 2007 In the late 1950s the RCAF was faced with a decision on the replacement of the Canadair F-86 Sabre Mk.6 and the Avro Canada CF-100 Canuck which equipped the twelve squadrons in the 1 Air Division serving with NATO forces in Europe. Canada was being pressured by NATO to undertake a nuclear strike role as part of the limited nuclear warfare policy being implemented at the time. In July, 1959 the Canadian Government announced the selection of a Canadian built version of the F-104G Starfighter to fulfill that commitment. Soon after, the government announced that the aircraft would be manufactured by Canadair Ltd. at Cartierville, Quebec, in the Montreal area, while Orenda Ltd. at Malton, Ontario, would manufacture the J79 engines under licence from General Electric. The Starfighter served with eight squadrons in the Air Division in Europe, six of which were tasked with the tactical nuclear strike role, while the remaining two performed photo reconnaissance duties. In the 1970s the nuclear strike role was abandoned and the formation was progressively reduced to three squadrons. The remaining Starfighters were equipped with cannon and conventional weapons for a ground support role. enthusiasts with a handbook on where to find the surviving retired military aircraft preserved in Canada. The majority of the Canadian Warbird and War Prize Survivors are on display within a significant number of aviation museums. Many others are displayed as "gate guards" on or near a number of Canadian and Allied Armed Forces Bases and installations. There are also a few in the hands of private owners and collectors that have been restored to flying status. These include a number of foreign warbird survivors that were brought back to Canada as War Prizes. The museum staffs and volunteer organizations such as the Canadian Aviation Preservation Association (CAPA) have done tremendous work in preserving military and civilian aircraft that have been a major part of Canada's aviation heritage. At the end of WWII his exceptional piloting skills resulted in a new career as a test pilot. Graduating from the Empire Test Pilot's School, he tested all the RAF's latest aircraft at a time of rapid technological advances, before joining the Gloster Aircraft Company to test fly the Meteor, one of the world's first operational jet fighters. A brilliant aerobatic pilot, Janusz invented the 'Zurabatic cartwheel', which stunned crowds at the Farnborough Air Show and remains one of the most incredible jet aircraft manoeuvres ever performed. Following a spectacular career in England, Janusz moved to Canada in 1952 as test pilot with AV Roe Ltd on Canada's first jet fighter - the CF-100 - and later the doomed supersonic interceptor aircraft, the CF-105 Avro Arrow. An outstanding airman in both war and peacetime, Zurkowski is regarded by many as 'a rare combination

of skilled engineer, painstaking test pilot and unparalleled display pilot'.
