The latter section discusses the circumstances around Anders Zorn's lawsuit against St. Louis millionaire and patron, Henry Clay Pierce, analyzing competing Gilded Age conceptions of a portrait's purpose. Zorn's dispute with

Pierce soon became public, with the conflict drawing in many local artists, revealing the industrial age tension between economic control wielded by the patron and the aesthetic authority granted the socially entrenched artist.
